Park Maintenance

A steel frame has been built into the side of the old kiosk to hold it upright. Before installing the frame, this structure had a dangerous lean. Graffiti was also painted over by a Council contractor. The cracked window near the kitchen area was replaced. Branches resting on the mains power lines were removed by Endeavour Energy and the power pole has been checked. Minor repairs and graffiti removal was done on the play equipment. Additional soft fall has been added to the play area.

Park Kitchen Upgrade

A Community funded Project

The Park kitchen has been transformed. It is already proving to be a great benefit to people hiring the hall for private functions. I am sure it will be a great asset during the Arts Festival and other community functions. There are a number of minor outstanding jobs (more locked cupboards, switching of spot lights to the fluorescent circuit etc) that we expect will be completed soon.

The new kitchen has an island bench that can be used as a servery, additional cupboards, an instant boiling water heater, a new ¾ sized fridge, new hot water cylinder and a heating oven. The kitchen is for serving food. It is not meant to be used for food preparation.

The first meeting of the Park Kitchen Refurbishment Committee was held in January 2014 to formulate a basic design. Staff from Hawkesbury City Council (HCC) met with us on 7th March where the design was further developed and they took over managing the project. The project was completed last December after some delays. Apologies to those who were inconvenienced. Thanks to those who contributed to the project and especially to Greg, Hawkesbury City Council (HCC) who managed the project.

BUSH FIRE LIAISON OFFICER'S REPORT – FEBRUARY 2015

The following information is provided to supplement the article printed in the Summer edition (December 2014) of the Bowen Mountain Association Inc. Newsletter entitled "Are You Firewise?". This information will be included on the Bowen Mountain Association Inc. Website.

There are two Rural Fire Stations located in the Grose Vale/Bowen Mountain area. These Fire Stations are located in Cabbage Tree Road, Grose Vale – known as the main station and the other is in Lieut. Bowen Drive, Bowen Mountain, directly opposite the end of Waratah Street, Bowen Mountain.

Both Rural Fire Stations are staffed by male and female RFS Volunteers on an "as required" basis and are available to respond to call-outs by pager, SMS and telephone calls including mobile 'Phone Communications.

The Headquarters for the Hawkesbury Local Government Rural Fire District is located in Macquarie Road Wilberforce and for general inquiries telephone 4560-6400.

The Captain of Grose Vale Rural Fire Brigade is Paul Dillon who can be contacted on 4572-1356 or

mobile 0459-259-630. The Senior Deputy Captain is David Prince who can be contacted on 4572-1943 or mobile 0420-943-728.

Permits to burn piles of vegetation (not including house-hold rubbish) can be issued by the Permits Officer, Bob Turner during the Bush Fire Season, (October to March). During the winter OFF bush fire season, permits to carry out Pile Burns must be obtained through the Hawkesbury City Council Pile Burn Authority. Telephone No. 4575-1143.

All fires and other emergencies should always be reported to the Emergency Telephone No. 000 in the first instance.\

Your local Rural Fire Brigade (GVRFB) will, if possible always respond to fire calls and other emergencies in the Hawkesbury Local Government area including Structural Fires (buildings) and Motor Vehicle Accidents.

Vale Rita Rutkovskis



It was with deep sorrow that the community learnt of Rita's death on 6 February at Hawkesbury Hospital. Rita was a much loved popular and well known member of the Bowen Mountain community for over twenty years. She was a valued member of the Newsletter Committee as a "cover girl", cartoonist and proof reader - and as a trained graphic artist, ticket writer and colourful painter had a long association with the Arts Festival Committee. Rita was also the instigator of our tai chi group on Sunday in the Park. In the winter issue of 2013 newsletter Michael Campbell had a chat with Rita in his "Hello Neighbour" column, at her home in Currawong Crescent, and from this article we learn many of the fascinating aspects of Rita's long and interesting life.

Rita was born in Riga, Latvia on 9 September 1933, but after the Soviet invasion in 1940 the family moved to Germany where Rita continued her education. In 1949, after many moves around Germany, the family migrated to Australia, and spent some time in a migrant camp out of Bathurst. They finally moved to Sydney, where Rita went on to qualify as a graphic artist at the Sydney School of Arts in Darlinghurst.

While living in Revesby, Rita met and married her "Monte" (Imants) and in 1994 they moved to Bowen Mountain. Rita became involved in the activities that were to become an important part of her life. Her brilliant artistic skills were essential to the Arts Committee and to the Newsletter, where she competently illustrated many stories and covers, and with her sharp wit and sense of humour she drew a number of cartoons. Rita was also a member and leader of a number of tai chi groups in the area. She was a great lover of the bush and enjoyed bird watching, identifying native plants, and before Monte's death, going on long trips to the outback. More recently she indulged in another passion by joining a local philosophy group.

Rita was kind, compassionate and funny and a very good friend to those who were lucky to know her.

We will miss you Rita.

Kosciuszko to Coogee

Veteran resident of the mountain Lance Mitchell tells how he has started a new fund raising event incorporating a 700 kilometre bicycle ride from the summit of Mt Kosciuszko to the beach at Coogee, to support Down Syndrome NSW.

Cameron Carmody and I grew up together on the corner of Crag Cr. and Lt Bowen Rd, Bowen Mountain, from the age of 4 and 3, respectively. One of my earliest childhood memories is sitting in the front yard at my Mum and Dad's place on Lt Bowen Rd, waiting for Cameron to come home from Grose View Public School. I can clearly remember walking with him to old John Edmonson's bus stop on my first day of school, waving goodbye to Dad from the bottom of the hill near Di Turner's place, with Cameron there at my shoulder. My unofficial older brother.

As with all close childhood friendships, the tapestry of our memories and the stories of our lives is both rich and detailed. We have been best friends forever, Cameron being the Best Man at our wedding. I returned a similar favour when he married another Colo High friend, Rebecca Fisher.

For as long as I can remember, Cameron has been a hero, a brother and a mate. He has rushed to my side both physically and metaphorically through all trials of life. Whilst Cameron has since moved away from the mountain we have remained the very best of friends.

Through early 2013 Cameron and I spoke regularly and excitedly about the pregnancy of his beautiful wife Rebecca. Cameron was going to be a Daddy.

During the week of Rebecca's due date there was a sudden and suspicious lack of communication. This disconcerting silence was guillotined by a notably reserved phone call from Cameron, during which he quietly explained that Rebecca had given birth to a little baby girl, Alicia.

Alicia had been born with Transient Leukaemia and Down syndrome.

As one could imagine we extended our unconditional love and support, and did what we could to help. The first and most obvious step was to help Alicia through the chemotherapy and to stabilise her health as best as possible. This was a rough time for everyone, but particularly so for Cameron and Rebecca and their families, but little Alicia showed the gumption of a weathered soldier and pulled through the storm.

Whilst clearly not a matter of life and death, the sudden and quite unexpected Down syndrome diagnosis nevertheless concerned Cameron and Rebecca greatly as they had previously had minimal

exposure to syndrome and knew little about it. They found themselves riding a particularly daunting roller feeling coaster, quite alone. In the darkness of their isolation



lighthouse beam cut out from the horizon: Down Syndrome NSW.

DS NSW refer to themselves as a 'Human Rights Organisation', and that just about explains everything.

It represents the heart of all the inspiration I will ever need to complete a thousand rides. Their benevolence sparked a fire of determination in my heart and galvanised my resolve to do something... to do anything.

They champion the rights of the Down syndrome community and provide DS families with services such as network based communication and peer support groups, resourcing, advice, 24 hour support networks, emergency contacts and community events. They have an enviable library, community engagement officers and a benevolent and compassionate support crew ready to assist DS Families and individuals from all walks of life. They celebrate the amazing achievements of people living with Down syndrome and engage regularly with the community to generate public awareness and support. I held little Alicia in my arms for the first time and smiled. Never in my life have I felt so consumed by such a wave of furious resolve, mixed with inspiration, love and commitment. A ferocious conviction to do absolutely everything within my power to shine a light, to level the playing field, to challenge, fight, sing, and shout. To celebrate the amazing person Alicia is, the courage that she and thousands like her, will summon on a daily basis to be the best that they can be.

A thought struck me. What could I possibly do to champion this little princess? Little old Me. How could I help? Where would I start?

The question of why I couldn't, shouldn't or wouldn't simply never occurred to me. I just needed to find the hardest, craziest, most bizarre and gruelling ordeal to personify a 'lightning rod' of public attention for DS NSW, to generate public awareness, gather funds and meet new people. To repay the support given by DS NSW to Alicia and countless families like hers.

Kosciuszko to Coogee cont.

It was soon after this, standing in the shower one morning that I came up with the silliest idea I could. Why not ride my old push bike from the lofty summit of Mt Kosciuszko all the way to the city somewhere, stopping in as many towns as possible to talk to people about the great work of DSNSW? I'm not a cyclist. In fact, I have rarely ridden a bike since Cameron and I used to ride our BMXs to the bus stop or to the bike track at the end of the Drive. But I could make it... surely. If the bike failed I'd walk the rest of the way. If my legs fail I'll crawl. Perhaps such an outrageous idea would draw attention to the matter in question. I had an image of Forrest Gump running along a desolate alpine



highway, all alone, watching the sun rise. That would be me, just on a bike.

The idea of finishing at the beach contrasted nicely

with the idea of starting above the snow line, so Coogee was chosen. I will start on 21 March (World Down Syndrome Day) and finish over the Easter long weekend, covering over 700 kms and stopping in more than 50 mountain and coastal townships.

I will be riding solo, with my parents Howard & Judith Mitchell as my support crew. In talking with local bike clubs there is a chance I will be accompanied by the occasional cyclist. My 6 year old daughter Maisie Mitchell has even volunteered to ride some parts of a stage on her bright pink push bike, complete with sparkles, tassles and spokeydokeys. She will be carrying a bucket asking for donations along the way.

Some people have asked me if I have a dollar figure in mind, but I don't. I just want to make a difference. If I only raise a few hundred dollars, and speak to a few hundred people about Down syndrome, then it will be worth all the blisters and hills in the world. My one regret is that I only have enough time strength and stamina to finish one ride. So much more needs to be done.


KOALAS IN KURRAJONG

For a number of years koala surveys have been conducted in the Richmond/Kurrajong area and this led to a sighting being made during late November 2008.

The Western Sydney area, including the Kurrajong district was once one of the strongholds for the koala population in early and pre-settlement days. This was probably due to the abundance of the eucalypt varieties that are their preferred food source.

Although it appears now that the presence of koalas in this area is rare, and almost extinct, there have been a number of sightings in the Lower Blue Mountains and Hawkesbury in recent months. It is not a common sight but this koala is looking very comfortable in a gum tree in Greggs Road Kurrajong in January this year.

Culinary Corner

Mango Fruit Cake

Ingredients

- 1 x 425 can mango slices in natural juice
- 500 g mixed dried fruit

- ½ cup water
- 1½ teaspoons bicarbonate of soda
- 1½ cups self raising flour
- 2 eggs, lightly beaten

Method

- 1. Grease 15cm x 25cm loaf pan; line base and sides with baking paper.
- 2. Combine the undrained mango slices, mixed dried fruit and water in a large pan. Bring to boil and simmer, uncovered, for 1 minute; cool.
- 3. Stir in combined sifted bicarbonate of soda and flour with eggs; mix well. Pour mixture into the prepared pan.
- 4. Cook in a moderate oven, 160°C for about 1 hour, or until cooked when tested. Cool cake in pan.




