

FIRE LIAISON REPORT

As you may well be aware, Bowen Mountain and Grose Vale area has had a relatively dry Spring that has seen considerable drying of vegetation, leaf litter and sub soil. The Bureau of Meteorology seasonal outlook suggests a continuance of warmer and drier than normal conditions over coming months that may increase the potential for fire in our District during the summer period.

Bush Fire Season: for the Hawkesbury has been on since the 1st September and fire permits will be required for those wishing to conduct a burn, in addition to the requirements of Hawkesbury City **Council Open Burning Policy.**

Pile Burns: if you are planning to undertake a pile burn, it is a requirement that you notify Hawkesbury City Council all year round and during the fire season, obtain a permit by contacting Hawkesbury District Fire Control Office.

Total Fire Bans: On very high to extreme fire days, bush and grass fires are more likely to spread and cause damage when the weather is very hot, dry and windy. Therefore, to reduce the risk of fires damaging or destroying life, property and the environment, the NSW RFS Commissioner may declare a Total Fire Ban.

Total Fire Bans helps limit the potential of fires developing and the NSW Rural Fire Service notes a Total Fire Ban means; no fires out in the open. During a Total Fire Ban you cannot light, maintain or use a fire in the open, or to carry out any activity in the open that causes, or is likely to cause, a fire. No general purpose hot works, such as welding, grinding or gas cutting can be done in the open and the NSW RFS strongly recommends activities such as using a tractor or slashing on rural properties and acreage, be carefully considered.

Can I use an electric BBO? - you may to use an electric barbeque for cooking as long as it is under the direct control of a responsible adult, who is present at all times while it is operating, and no combustible material is allowed within 2 metres at any time it is operating.

Can I use a gas BBQ? - You may use a gas

barbecue under the following conditions:

- It is under the direct control of a responsible adult, who is present at all times while it is operating; No combustible material is allowed within 2 metres at any time it is operating;
- You have an immediate and continuous supply of water: and
- The barbecue is within 20 metres of a permanent private dwelling such as a home; or
- The barbecue is within a designated picnic area and the appliance is approved by Council, National Parks or State Forest.

Can I use a BBQ or pizza oven that burns solid fuel (e.g. wood, charcoal, heat beads)? - No. A barbecue or wood fired pizza oven that uses solid fuel, such as wood, charcoal or heat beads, cannot be used outside during a Total Fire Ban.

Can I use fire during a Total Fire Ban if I have a fire permit? - Permits are suspended on days of a Total Fire Ban. Permits may resume after the Total Fire Ban is lifted, as long as the permit hasn't expired. Contact your Brigade Permit Officer or the nearest NSW RFS Fire Control centre for further information.

Are there any exemptions during a Total Fire **Ban?** - A range of activities may be exempt from Total Fire Bans, such as emergency infrastructure work, beehive smokers, mining operations, sugar cane harvesting, use of fireworks or ceremonial fires. The NSW RFS Commissioner is responsible for exemptions to Total Fire Bans and these exemptions are detailed in the NSW Government Gazette each time a Total Fire Ban is declared.

What penalties are there for lighting a fire during a Total Fire Ban? - Lighting a fire on a day of Total Fire Ban attracts an on the spot fine of **\$2,200**. If the matter goes to court, you could be subject to a fine of up to \$5,500 and/or 12 months gaol. Penalties for a fire that escapes and damages or destroys life, property or the environment can attract much greater fines and gaol terms with maximums at \$132,000 and/or 14 years gaol. Civil law suits can also be brought against the person responsible for a fire by those seeking compensation for losses sustained.

What is a No Burn day? - The EPA may prohibit the burning of fires in the open or in incinerators by issuing a No-Burn Notice if it is of the opinion that, because forecast weather conditions, burning is likely to contribute to the build-up of air pollution. To find out if a No-Burn notice is in force check the EPA website or check the Public Notices section of the Sydney Morning Herald. A No-Burn notice will be published in the newspaper on the day it is in force; or call the EPA Environmental Information Line on 131 555.

PREPARE YOUR BUSH FIRE SURVIVAL PLAN - FOUR SIMPLE STEPS



STEP 1 - DISCUSS WHAT TO DO IF A BUSH FIRE THREATENS YOUR HOME

Many households find that having a discussion over dinner works best, as everybody is together and focussed.



STEP 2 - PREPARE YOUR HOME AND GET IT READY FOR BUSH FIRE SEASON

There are simple things you can do around your home to prepare it for a bush fire, such as keeping the grass low and having a cleared area around your home.



STEP 3 - KNOW THE BUSH FIRE ALERT LEVELS

If there is a fire in your area, you will find its alert level on the NSW RFS website and in the 'Fires Near Me' app. You need to keep track of the alert level so you know what you should do.



STEP 4 - KEEP ALL THE BUSH FIRE INFORMATION NUMBERS, WEBSITES AND THE SMARTPHONE APP

In a bush fire, it is important that you stay up to date on conditions in your area.

It is a fact. If you and your home are well prepared, you stand a better chance of surviving a bush fire. Download the four simple steps today from the NSW Rural Fire website at:

Our Bowen Mountain community is also special because of all the things we do the help others. I am part of a team that is raising money for the Black Dog Institute by paddling in the Massive Murray Paddle in November. My family as well as two other Bowen Mountain families are involved and we will paddle 402kms down the Murray River over 5 days.

Came to Australia in 1981

Was in Villawood Hostel six months. Rented a house at Castle Hill and later in Kings Langley. Bought a house in Seven Hills and lived there for seventeen years. We had talked about a move to another area but we just talked. One



day our eldest son came home with one of these Real Estate books. He showed us a house at Bowen Mountain, we had no idea where that was. We called the Real Estate agent, (Cathy McManus) on a Saturday morning and about 10.00am we came to No.18 Bunya Crescent and we bought it the same

day. This happened in December 2002.

When we moved in, the neighbour in No. 20 came and said "welcome to paradise". On one of the first days I met a nice lady in the park – Martha. I was a self-employed Electrician-Contractor. And Martha gave me several customer contacts, even on Bowen Mountain. Another contact was on the other side of Penrith and there were also several others. My thanks to Martha. It was good I met her.

We had three dogs. One German Shepherd, and two Labradors. We walked them every day. There were long walks in the bush, they loved it. My German Shepherd developed cancer and we had to say farewell to him.

One day I took the two Labradors to the park (including Poo-bags). The dogs went over to the playground to say "hello" to the kids. We always, after the walk, ended in the park. On one occasion, while sitting on the bench, the kids came to say "hello" to the dogs. There was something special in the air that day, the atmosphere, the dogs and the kids that I got the idea to start a Dog Club. I put a little note in the Newsletter and I talked to other dog owners about the Dog Club.

The Dog Club existed for almost two years. John Holmes came over into the park but had no dog. "Don't worry John" I said, 'I have two dogs, borrow one of mine". Neil Hartley also enjoyed coming over to the park. As we all know, Neil's hearing is zero, so he reads your lips when you talk to him. But Neil said to me "I can't understand you, you are mumbling". I told Neil it was my accent – good laugh. Our dogs went up to the Rainbow Meadow and some dog owners and their dogs moved to other areas, so the Dog Club slowly ended. We do have a good society and we were lucky to have good neighbours.

Four years ago I had a cardio-vascular arrest. When I came home from hospital, I got so many flowers and cards. It was fantastic and it helped me a lot to get back to normal life.

Nineteen years have passed, and things have changed. Years ago, for the AGM meeting there were many people, today very few. What a shame. Over many years our committee members have worked hard to get things done on Bowen Mountain. All the young people should show their respect to those people who have worked so hard to get things done

However, I also know that if you have kids, school and sports, it takes a lot of time, but see if you can have some spare time for the BMA Association.



Bowen Mountain Halloween Festival, 2019

In early October, rumours began circulating about a ghostlike apparition seen at odd hours around Bowen Mountain. Numerous reports of a "Headless Hitchhiker" wandering Bowen Mountain Road between Serpentine Lane and Gunbower Rd were issued by concerned residents. Old folk from the mountain remembered a story from long ago of a German hitch hiker by the name of Walter Hermann Heinrich who was tragically struck whilst attempting to leave the mountain late one night. Suspicions arose as to whether this was indeed his ghost, still trying to leave the mountain.

As darkness fell on the mountain visitors to Bowen Mountain Park began to notice the rotten wooden fence of an ancient, abandoned graveyard. Smoke drifted through old rotten timber, dead flowers adored makeshift graves, and above it all, hung the silent headless corpse of macabre headless hitchhiker holding a rose. A banshee screamed overhead, a skeleton hand protruded from one of the graves... the 2019 Halloween Festival had begun!

This year marked an incredible effort on behalf of the small but energetic Halloween Committee. There were fascinating sets and displays sprinkled all over the park. A huge graveyard full of fresh graves, weathered crucifixes marked by old crooked and splintered picket fences. A towering Jack Skelington lurched in the breeze surrounded by moldy nooses and jack-o-lanterns. The old gravity feed tank created mystery and intrigue again with the haunting story of Ryan Turner, lured into a watery tomb by the ghost of William Clifton. Passers-by could hear the laughter of a small boy echoing up from the old tank. There were witch's hats hanging from trees, lanterns bejeweling the old mossy oak tree and hundreds of haunting pictures of Halloween costumes of yesteryear, circa 1920.

There were games and activities for the kids (Zombie Bullrush, Three-Legged Monster Races, Eye-ball-and-spoon Races).

The festival was again blessed with the Australian Fursuiters, who brought their unusual hilarity and spontaneous energy. The Grose View Dance Group was a crowd favourite with a 'Flash Mob' style dance that thoroughly entertained the large gathering.

Olivia, Grace and Ashley Barker stunned a huge crowd with their incredible circus act. Contortionism, dancing and an awe-inspiring display of foot archery left everybody breathless and amazed.

There was live music by awesome Bowen Mountain resident musicians Raf and Fernando, who played many sets and provided a wonderful atmosphere by providing 30 large samba drums and running drumming classes for anyone who was keen to give it a go.

There was face-painting, fairy floss, arts and craft, and of course, the famous BMA BBQ.

There was an abundance of amazing cupcakes thanks to Evette Sinton and Christine Johns—graveyard themed, poo themed and day-of-the-dead inspired cupcakes to name just a few.

The Festival concluded with a huge Fancy Dress Parade. The Grim Reaper arrived on a Harley Davidson and threw handfuls of lollies to the kids. He also awarded prizes kindly donated by Goodie Goodie Gumdrops to the winners of each category. "Atrocious Adults" was won by the Big Scary Clown. "Terrible Teens" was won by Pennywise, "Korrosive Kids" was won by The Wolf who ate Grandma and "Terrifying Toddlers" was won by the cutest little Beetlejuice you have ever seen.

The most entertaining of all was the incredible array of costumes worn by festival goers. There were families of zombies, witches and superheroes. Villains, butchers and princesses. Snap, Send, Solve

A useful app

This App allows the user to identify and photograph issues (eg damage) and send it and a notification to the relevant authorities (eg local council, Sydney Water...) If you are connected to the internet while taking the photo the App will (if you have allowed location) automatically send details of the location. If not connected, it is necessary to put a "pin drop" on a map while connected.

An example of a successful reported issue was

recently while we were in Kiama. we noticed a leaking water hydrant with water flowing down the street. We took a photo using the App, went back to our friends place, identified the location on a map while internet connected and sent the photo and brief note to Sydney Water. The next day we saw them fixing the leaking hydrant; water and road damage saved. Of course, the effectiveness of the App depends on the relevant authority responding!

Culinary Corner

WIZARD'S BLOOD BROWNIES – RED VELVET CHEESECAKE SWIRL BROWNIES

Red Velvet Brownies

2 large eggs
1/2 cup (1 stick or 115g) unsalted butter
1 cup (200g) granulated sugar
2 teaspoons pure vanilla extract
1/4 cup (21g) unsweetened cocoa powder
a pinch of salt
1 tablespoon liquid or gel red food colouring
3/4 teaspoon white vinegar
3/4 cup (95g) self raising flour

Cheesecake Swirl
8 ounces (224g) cream cheese, softened
1/4 cup (50g) granulated sugar
1 egg yolk
1/2 teaspoon pure vanilla extract

METHOD

- 1. Preheat oven to 180 degrees
- 2. Spray 8×8 baking pan with non-stick spray.
- 3. Make the brownie layer first: In a small bowl, beat the 2 eggs together. Set aside. Melt the butter in a large microwave safe bowl in 30 second increments until melted. Stir in 1 cup sugar, 2 teaspoons vanilla extract, cocoa powder, salt, food colouring, and vinegar. Mix each of those ingredients into the batter in that order. Whisk in the eggs, then fold in the flour until completely incorporated. Do not overmix. Pour the brownie batter into prepared baking pan, leaving about 3-4 tablespoons for the top.
- 4. Make the cheesecake swirl: With a hand-held mixer on medium speed, beat the softened cream cheese, 1/4 cup sugar, egg yolk, and 1/2 teaspoon vanilla in a medium bowl until completely smooth about 1 minute. Dollop spoonfuls of the cream cheese mixture on top of the prepared brownie batter. Cover with the last few tablespoons of brownie batter. Glide a knife through the layers, creating a swirl pattern.
- 5. Bake the brownies for 28-30 minutes or until a toothpick inserted in the middle comes out clean. Allow the brownies to cool completely before cutting into squares. Cover brownies and store at room temperature for 3 days or in the refrigerator for up to 6 days.

Freezing Instructions: Brownies will freeze well, up to 2 months. Thaw overnight in the fridge.

WITCHES FINGERS - NO MEAT SAUSAGE ROLLS

1 cup of cottage cheese (low fat optional)
1/2 cup of pecans or walnuts (roughly chopped)
3 eggs
1 onion, chopped
1 tablespoon of soy sauce

1 cup of cooking oats 1/2 cup of dry breadcrumbs 3 sheets of puff pastry 1 tablespoon of milk



METHOD

- 1. Preheat oven to 180 degrees
- 2. Mix together cottage cheese, nuts, eggs, onion and soy sauce, then add oats and breadcrumbs. Mix well.
- 3. Cut each pastry sheet in half and brush edges with the milk.
- 4. Divide mixture and place along edge of each pastry sheet then roll up the pastry. Brush with milk and use a fork to stab air holes in the pastry then cut up the each roll into 5 piece to make bite size sausage rolls (sprinkle with sesame seeds optional).
- 5. Place on a lightly greased tray and place in the oven for 20-25 mins or till golden.
