Life's Journey - Hugh Walker

8th April 1935-12th November 2019

Hugh Walker (Hughie) was a long-time resident of Bowen Mountain. He could be seen walking his adopted West Highland Terrier "Archie" and his neighbour's dog "Buster". He walked from one end of the mountain to the other, his daily exercise helping to control his diabetes. Buster enjoyed his walks but thought it futile walking down dead end roads. When Hughie walked down Red Gum and Crag Crescent Buster would refuse and look at Hughie as if to say "why walk there, there is nothing there". He would sit at the junction and faithfully await Hughie's return.

Hughie (one of five) was born in Greymouth, on the west coast of the south Island of New Zealand. He joined the NZ Navy (1952) as a junior stoker and rose to petty officer. He was the youngest petty officer in the NZ Navy at the time. He saw service which included travelling to England on the HMNZS Black Prince for the coronation of Queen

Elizabeth II. On his return from England his ship was diverted to give aid at Argostoli, Cephalonia, in the Aegean Sea where an earthquake had devastated the town. He was finally based in Singapore. Returning to Greymouth he worked for the NZ Railways, then later as a postman.

Hughie arrived in Australia in 1973 and shortly after moved to Bowen Mountain. He worked for the NSW Grain Board assessing grain quality. He became Senior Pest Inspector for NSW which involved spending weeks at a time visiting silos in the west. He could name and give you the history of every wheat silo in the state. On retirement (1990) Hughie kept busy gardening, renovating his house, home brewing and walking the mountain with his dogs and talking to passers-by.

INUNDATED - from drought to flood in 48 hours

Read the headline in the Hawkesbury Gazette dated Wednesday August 13, 1986.

Here are a few excerpts from that edition.

The rain kept falling and the river kept on rising. The 210mm recorded for the 24 hours was the highest daily August fall on record. The previous highest was 140mm.

The worst flood to hit the Hawkesbury since the legendary 1867 inundation was in November 1961 - the river rose to a height of 15.10 metres and remains the worst flood recorded this century. The legendary 1867 was horrific. The river rose to 19.26 metres. Since recordings were made back in 1799 the river has never reached anywhere near this height before.


The graph on the right shows the rainfalls reported by 23 volunteers in the Hawkesbury for the days preceding the flood event on Sunday night 9th February. See:

The height of the river on 11th of February at North Richmond was around 11.4 metres with a lot of debris, which broke the barriers on the bridge. What is obvious is that the flood rose so quickly, that there was no time to take the barriers down. Sounds very similar to 1986

The 1978 flood caused havor throughout the district and was the third highest flood this century and caused millions of dollars of damage to property and crop losses. The Hawkesbury Shire State Emergency Service came to the fore, evacuating stranded residents, taking food parcels to isolated areas and dropping fodder to stranded stock.

Hawkesbury Shire President, Cr. Geoff Michael called for the construction of the *Grose River Bridge* as soon as possible. "The proposed high level bridge that will provide access from Bells Line of Road at North Richmond to the Springwood Road at Yarramundi and then to Springwood on the Great Western Highway is an essential link both in terms of providing free flood access and a link to the future western expressway", he said (in 1986).

Park Report

Bowen Mountain Park Management Committee (BMPMC)

Last year was a hive of activity in the park; projects, events and public use of the park

Projects completed last year

- basketball hoop
- maintenance and gardening, planting of the Wollemi and discovering the self-sown Bunya pine
- audio system for the hall
- upgrade of the CCTV cameras
- installation of guttering and 2,000L water tank for the BBQ shelter

Sebastian (Bluee Technology, North Richmond) for the upgrade of the CCTV camera system

The Council arranged a contractor (26th June) to clean the water tank. There was a great quantity of muck pumped out. A water level measuring device and cage was also installed.

Maintenance - the Zip instant hot water sprung a leak again, (20th Jan 20) repaired by Council Plumber. It is a concern if nobody is present to close the isolating tap to prevent flooding.

During this summer season there was an enormous accumulation of dry leaves and branches at the park. This is a significant fire hazard for the park, its infrastructure and to the community

Pole in the Car Park - now that NBN is "approaching", Council have been asked if it is possible for the pole in the car park to be moved.

Events - What an amazing year 2019 has been for our wonderful community!

January saw the return of our annual Disco which once again was a successful event with many fantastic dancers and smiling faces. We also ran our very first

Spring Market in October and despite the day being

quite blustery, residents travelled from all over the Hawkesbury to our beautiful park. Welcome to the Fire Liaison Officer's Report

This year we have seen an extraordinary fire season that has affected most parts of NSW. As at the end of January 2020 the total area of NSW burnt since the 1st July 2019 has totalled almost 5.5 million hectares.

Gospers Mountain Fire

Throughout November and December residents and properties of Bowen Mountain and Grose Vale lived under the threat of the Gospers Mountain Fire, which, after starting from a lightning strike on the 26th October 2019 was finally contained on the 11th January 2020. The fire was unprecedented in that it has burnt an area of approximately 512,000 hectares across a number of local government areas in addition to Wollemi National Park, Yengo National Park, Parr State Conservation Area, part of the Blue Mountains National Park and Newnes State Forest. With the perimeter of this fire covering an area extending west from Lithgow, east to St Albans, north beyond Putty and south to the Grose Valley, significant fire fighting resources and support were required, not only on the fire ground but also at Hawkesbury, Lithgow and Hunter Fire Control Centres. The combined cooperation of the NSW RFS, Fire + Rescue NSW, NSW National Parks & Wildlife NSW Service. NSW Police, Ambulance, Hawkesbury City Council, Australian Defence Force and countless other organisations and volunteers demonstrated the resilience and teamwork required in dealing with this fire and other fires which were also occurring at the time.

Along with brigades from the Hawkesbury District and other regions, members from Grose Vale Brigade continued to crew its vehicles day and night to battle this fire for the duration until it was finally contained.

Thank You

In any event, where there is a potential threat to life and property, the support and cooperation of the community is most important to ensure emergency services can undertake their vital work. To this point, Grose Vale Brigade extends its thanks and gratitude to the communities of Bowen Mountain and Grose Vale for the support, cooperation and respect provided to the Brigade and its members. Combined with the many donations of water, drinks and food, the willingness of the community to attend community meetings, prepare properties, assist each other, advise the availability of static water supplies, provide access to properties and heed the advice and warnings is greatly appreciated. Thank you so very much.

Bush Fire Danger Period and Fire Permits:

While the Bush Fire Season for the Hawkesbury

District usually finishes on the 31st March, should the warmer weather conditions prevail and a return to lower than average rainfall occurs, then there may be the possibility for the season to be extended beyond this date. If the season is to be extended, then this information will be advised through the NSW RFS Website, normal media channels and social media pages.

Residents are reminded that as we progress towards the end of the Bush Fire Season, Fire Permits for Pile Burns are still required.

What is a Fire Permit?

Fire Permits help ensure fire is used safely during the Bush Fire Danger Period. A permit imposes conditions on the way a fire is lit and maintained, and can only be issued by authorised Permit Issuing Officers.

The permit system ensures agencies such as the NSW RFS know when and where landholders intend to burn, to ensure adequate and appropriate measures are in place, and so that fires remain under control.

The Permit Issuing Officer may add any conditions deemed as necessary but all permits have standard conditions such as:

- the permit is to be carried by the permit holder, on site, at the time the fire is lit
- the permit is to remain on site with those present until extinguished, if applicable
- the fire must be supervised at all times unless the permit says otherwise
- notifications are given to the NSW RFS, and adjoining neighbours at least 24 hours (unless specified otherwise) prior to the fire being lit and
- the permit may be varied, cancelled or suspended, depending on weather conditions.

When are permits required?

The statutory Bush Fire Danger Period runs from 1 October to 31 March, however it may vary due to local conditions. If you are planning to light a fire in the open during this time, you will need a Fire Permit.

Also depending on the type of fire, a permit may be required all year round. For example, a Fire Permit is required at all times if a fire is likely to be dangerous to a building.

When are permits not required?

Fire Permits are not required for fires for the purpose of cooking food, provided that:

- the fire is in a permanently constructed fireplace;
- at a site surrounded by ground that is cleared of all combustible materials for a distance of at least two metres all around;
- the fire is completely extinguished before leaving.



What else do I need to do?

Before lighting the fire ensure that:

- it can be contained and controlled within the specified area
- it does not contain toxic materials, such as rubber tyres, plastics, paint etc; and
- it must not cause an air pollution problem by producing excessive amounts of smoke.

If you have a permit, it is your responsibility to:

- check whether a Total Fire Ban in force on the NSW RFS Fire Danger ratings and Total Fire Bans page: https://www.rfs.nsw.gov.au/fireinformation/fdr-and-tobans. If there is, your permit is automatically suspended
- check whether a No Burn day has been declared on the EPA website
- check the expected weather conditions
- notify and check with your local NSW RFS Fire Control Centre or Fire + Rescue NSW station prior to lighting

Fines and penalties for illegal burning

Substantial fines and prison terms of up to 12 months may apply to persons found to be in breach of the Rural Fires Act 1997 and its Regulations. Civil law suits can also be brought against persons responsible for fire, by those seeking compensation,

for losses sustained.

The key things to remember

- follow any conditions and or restrictions listed in your permit
- You need a fire permit if it's the Bush Fire Danger Period. There are heavy penalties if you don't follow restrictions or rules
- Just because it's the Bush Fire Danger Period doesn't mean you can't use fire - but there are restrictions to ensure fire is used safely
- Getting a permit is free and easy. Further information is available from the Hawkesbury District Fire Control Centre on: 4560 6400 and the Hawkesbury City Council website: www.hawkesbury.nsw.gov.au/environment/health-and-safety/open-burning or contacting Hawkesbury City Council on 4560 4444.

Finally, now is the time to check and test your smoke alarms ensuring you have an adequate number of suitable smoke alarms installed throughout your home. You should also change the battery at least every 12 months. Culinary Corner

SCOTTISH OAT CAKES

Very easy recipe to follow and I have been making them for an English old lady who had a Scottish husband. She confirmed that is an authentic biscuit which she loves.

2½ cups rolled oats ½ cup plain flour 1 teaspoonsalt

½ teaspoon baking soda or bicarbonate soda 60g unsalted or salted butter - room temp. 100ml water - room temp.

METHOD

- 1. Preheat oven to 180 °C
- 2. In a large bowl, mix all the dry goods oats, flour, salt, baking powder, sugar together
- 3. Add the room temperature butter them rub together to combine them well until the mixture forms bread crumbs
- 4. Sprinkle extra flour on a surface and roll out the dough to less than 0.5cm thickness. Use a cookie cutter to cut out (it is your choice of size)

RICHMOND BRIDGE DUPLICATION AND TRAFFIC IMPROVEMENTS - UPDATE

PROJECT BACKGROUND

The bridge between Richmond and North Richmond provides a vital crossing of the Hawkesbury River, and carries an average of 31,000 vehicles per day with a single lane in each direction.

In 2013, Roads and Maritime Services (now part of Transport for NSW) prepared the Richmond Bridge and approaches congestion study: preferred short term and long term options report. The study identified the need for additional bridge capacity and three intersections upgrades to improve travel times and journey time reliability and provide for future growth.

PROJECT BENEFITS

The benefits of the Richmond Bridge Duplication and traffic improvements could include:

• providing a longer term solution to help in reducing congestion around the Richmond area.

- reducing travel times
- improving journey time reliability for public transport
- improving active transport connections
- improving flood resilience for residents in Richmond and North Richmond.

NEXT STEPS

Following community information sessions in December 2019, Transport for NSW will develop an options report that will be released in 2020. There will be opportunities to provide feedback on the options report, before the preferred option is selected.


Road Sign suggested for the Wattle Street turn-off

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
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


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
