

#### PRESIDENT and SECRETARY'S REPORT OCTOBER - DECEMBER 2022

The Bowen Mountain Association has been kept busy throughout October through to December 2022 with a number of activities that seek to improve the quality of life of Bowen Mountain residents and its community. As a result of many Facebook posts and emails to the Bowen Mountain Association, the President and Secretary are in the process of contacting Hawkesbury City Council via phone and email to devise a priority list of Bowen Mountain community needs in particular the quality of the roads and overgrowth on the side of the road. Clearing of undergrowth and road edges has been a welcome sight on Bowen Mountain Road.

We look forward to answers from Council regarding several questions recently posed by the Bowen Mountain Association. These questions include:

- 1) Why have No Parking signs been erected in the turning circle of Lt Bowen Drive?
- 2) Why is the gate locked on Grandview Lane? What will happen in the case of fire?
- 3) When are the potholes on Bowen Mountain and Grose Vale Roads going to be fixed?
- 4) What is happening below Serpentine Lane where there has been concrete retaining walls put in place? What is happening with that corner? Have they found something that we should know about?

The Bowen Mountain Association gratefully accepted one free 3 x 3 metre gazebo from Bendigo Bank. This gazebo will be used for BMA functions in the park.

Due to COVID, adverse weather and floods the BMA has not presented the ever-popular Halloween in the Park for the last couple of years. However, this year we decided to investigate organising a different and unique Halloween to what we have had in the past. This year we brought the Bowen Mountain Halloween to the streets which involved a major competition with different categories such as best-decorated house, best-dressed child, teenager, adult and pet. People entered the competition by uploading their photos to the Bowen Mountain Facebook page where people voted for their favourite photo on the website. Thanks to Cindy Cash from Ray White who agreed to co-sponsor prizes to the value of \$250.

As part of our Community Care Outreach, Martha and Liz delivered 30 boxes of chocolates to residents. Christmas gift packs will also be delivered to residents to wish them a Merry Christmas.

Further to our reporting in the Spring 2022 Newsletter, on 20 October, 2022, the Hawkesbury Local Planning Panel of Hawkesbury City Council met via Zoom to review the development application (DA) lodged in 2021 by Optus to erect a 33 metre high mobile phone tower at 18 Lt. Bowen Road. A selection of respondents, including Bill Kerr, were each granted only 3 minutes to address the panel regarding their concerns that the tower was in breach of zoning requirements and would be far too close to surrounding residences. Subsequent to the HLPP meeting, a petition containing over 40 residents' names opposing the location of the tower was also submitted to Council by concerned residents.

In spite of these concerns, on 5 December, 2022, Hawkesbury City Council emailed advice to respondents that, back on 20 October, it had approved the DA for the tower to be built at 18 Lt. Bowen Road. We are most disappointed that Council has approved this facility to be built

within only a few metres of established residences with all the noise, visual appearance and potential radiation concerns that this will create.

The BMA is planning entertaining activities for 2023, which are on the advanced calendar in this newsletter and will be dependent on COVID and weather restrictions. The BMA will be on annual holidays during December and January and will resume meetings in February 2023. We would like to thank the Bowen Mountain Management Committee and the subcommittees for all their tireless work throughout 2022 as they strive to make Bowen Mountain a quality environment for all to enjoy. Without their commitment, dedication and tireless efforts, the Bowen Mountain Association would cease to exist. Finally, thank you, the residents of Bowen Mountain for your interest and support of the Bowen Mountain Association and all its activities.

On behalf of the Bowen Mountain Association, we would like to take this opportunity to wish you all a very merry, healthy and safe Holiday Season and a 2023 filled with peace, happiness, good health and success.

### RFS FIRE REPORT – Summer 2022-23

**Bush Fire Season:** The Bush Fire Season for the Hawkesbury began on the 1st October 2022 and will continue until the 31<sup>st</sup> March 2023, unless otherwise advised.

Pile Burns: If you are planning to undertake a pile burn, please note the following:

- 1. From the 1<sup>st</sup> October, you are required to obtain a **Fire Permit** which may be obtained by contacting the Grose Vale Brigade's Permit Issuing Officer.
- 2. Review the Hawkesbury City Council Open Burning Policy and complete the online notification at https://www.hawkesbury.nsw.gov.au/ resources/forms/open-burning
- 3. Notify the NSW RFS of your intention to undertake a pile burn by completing the online notification at https://www.rfs.nsw.gov.au/fire-information/BFDP/burn-notifications

#### **NOTE: Hawkesbury City Council advises the following:**

- a) Pile burns and other fires must be put out by the end of the day and <u>not</u> smoulder overnight.
- **b)** Within the Bushfire Danger Period, burning shall only be conducted between 8am and midnight on any day (the fire cannot burn all night).
- c) Outside the Bushfire Danger Period, burning shall only be conducted between 8am and 5pm on any day (the fire must be out by 5pm).

#### PREPARE YOUR BUSH FIRE SURVIVAL PLAN WITH FOUR SIMPLE STEPS

Residents are strongly advised to begin to review their Bush Fire Survival Plan and prepare their properties before the Bushfire Season begins



#### STEP 1 - DISCUSS WHAT TO DO IF A BUSH FIRE THREATENS YOUR HOME

Many households find that having a discussion over dinner works best, as everybody is together and focussed.



# STEP 2 - PREPARE YOUR HOME AND GET IT READY FOR BUSH FIRE SEASON

There are simple things you can do around your home to prepare it for a bush fire, such as keeping the grass low and having a cleared area around your home.



#### STEP 3 - KNOW THE BUSH FIRE ALERT LEVELS

If there is a fire in your area, you will find its alert level on the NSW RFS website and in the 'Fires Near Me' app. You need to keep track of the alert level so you know what you should do.



# STEP 4 - KEEP ALL THE BUSH FIRE INFORMATION NUMBERS, WEBSITES AND THE SMARTPHONE APP

In a bush fire, it is important that you stay up to date on conditions in your area.

It is a fact. If you and your home are well prepared, you stand a better chance of surviving a bush fire. Download the four simple steps today from the NSW Rural Fire website at:

#### Keep yourself informed on days of increased fire danger

If a bushfire is in your area or you are unsure, its important to stay up to date. In an emergency, call **Triple Zero (000)**, check the NSW RFS website (<a href="https://www.rfs.nsw.gov.au">www.rfs.nsw.gov.au</a>), download the **Fires Near Me** app, listen to local radio, local **ABC**, TV etc or check **facebook.com/nswrfs** or **twitter.com/nswrfs** 



#### **Total Fire Bans:**

On very high to extreme fire days, bush and grass fires are more likely to spread and cause damage when the weather is very hot, dry and windy. Therefore, to reduce the risk of fires damaging or destroying life, property and the environment, the NSW RFS Commissioner may declare a Total Fire Ban.

Total Fire Ban means; <u>no fires out in the open</u>. During a Total Fire Ban you cannot light, maintain or use a fire in the open, or to carry out any activity in the open that causes, or is likely to cause, a fire. **No general purpose hot works**, such as welding, grinding or gas cutting can be done in the open and the NSW RFS strongly recommends activities such as using a tractor or slashing on rural properties and acreage, be carefully considered.

**Can I use an electric BBQ?** – you may use an electric barbeque for cooking as long as it is under the direct control of a responsible adult, who is present at all times while it is operating, and no combustible material is allowed within **2 metres** at any time it is operating.

Can I use a gas BBQ? - You may use a gas barbeque under the following conditions:

It is under the direct control of a responsible adult, who is present at all times while it is operating;

- No combustible material is allowed within 2 metres at any time it is operating;
- You have an immediate and continuous supply of water; and
- The barbeque is within 20 metres of a permanent private dwelling such as a home; or
- The barbeque is within a designated picnic area and the appliance is approved by Council, National Parks or State Forest.

**Can I use a BBQ or pizza oven that burns solid fuel** (e.g. wood, charcoal, heat beads)? - **No**. A barbeque or wood fired pizza oven that uses solid fuel, such as wood, charcoal or heat beads, <u>cannot be used</u> outside during a Total Fire Ban.

Can I undertake a pile burn during a Total Fire Ban if I have a fire permit? - No. Permits are suspended on days of a Total Fire Ban. Permits may resume after the Total Fire Ban is lifted, as long as the permit hasn't expired. Contact your Brigade Permit Officer or Hawkesbury FS Fire Control Centre for further information

**Are there any exemptions during a Total Fire Ban? -** A range of activities may be exempt from Total Fire Bans. The NSW RFS Commissioner is responsible for exemptions to Total Fire Bans and these exemptions are detailed in the NSW Government Gazette each time a Total Fire Ban is declared.

What penalties are there for lighting a fire during a Total Fire Ban? - Lighting a fire on a day of Total Fire Ban attracts an on the spot fine of \$2200. If the matter goes to court, you could be subject to a fine of up to \$5500 and/or 12 months gaol. Penalties for a fire that escapes and damages or destroys life, property or the environment can attract much greater fines and gaol terms with maximums at \$132,000 and/or 14 years gaol. Civil law suits can also be brought against the person responsible for a fire by those seeking compensation for losses sustained.

What is a No Burn day? - The NSW Environment Protection Authority (EPA) may prohibit the burning of fires in the open or in incinerators by issuing a No-Burn Notice if it is of the opinion that, because forecast weather conditions, burning is likely to contribute to the build-up of air pollution. To find out if a No-Burn notice is in force check the <u>EPA website</u> or check the Public Notices section of the Sydney Morning Herald. A No-Burn notice will be published in the newspaper on the day it is in force; or call the EPA Environmental Information Line on 131 555.

#### EDITOR'S NOTE: Dorothea Mackellar's connection to Bowen Mountain


In the Bowen Mountain Association Newsletter Issue No.11 April, 1988 a drawing (below) of Woodberry Lodge by the then resident artist Molly Johnson was the cover feature. An article in the Newsletter states that "Woodberry Lodge is probably the oldest remaining structure on the mountain, being somewhere between 75 and 85 years old and used as a coach-house.

In the 1930's, a man named Mackellar bought the coach-house and a huge tract of land. He lived in the white farmhouse, which is now situated in Pamela Crescent. It must have been a shock to the coach-house, used to the jangle of harnesses and champing of horses, when Mackellar used it to garage his Rolls Royce!

Dorothea Mackellar, the Australian poet most renowned for her poem, "My Country," was a relative of this owner. Folklore has it that she may have even penned some of her poetry from the Lodge itself.

After Mackellar, the old coach-house was sold to a Mr. Southern who used it as a weekender. John Woodberry, a carpenter, then bought the property, revamping it and engraving "Woodberry Lodge" in the front doorsteps".

#### **New South Wales Christmas Bush**

The New South Wales Christmas Bush (*Ceratopetlum gummiferum*), which is prevalent on Bowen Mountain at this time of year is a shapely tree with distinctive pink or red bracts in summer which appear during the Christmas period hence the name of the bush. It is a wonderful natural cut flower or indoor display, which can be used as a Christmas decoration. The abundant red coloured star shaped sepals house the seed which is shed in February when they turn a light tan colour. The Christmas bush can last up to and beyond 100 years.

#### **BAILEY'S DIP - A YUMMY FESTIVE SEASON DESSERT**

#### **Ingredients:**

- 1/4 cup Baileys Liqueur
- 2 tablespoons light brown sugar
- 250 grams of light sour cream

#### **FESTIVE PUNCH**

#### **Ingredients:**

- 200g fresh or frozen raspberries or strawberries
- 2 tbs caster sugar
- 2 tbs lemon juice
- Ice cubes, to serve
- 1.5L rosé prosecco or raspberry-flavoured sparkling mineral water, chilled

#### Method:

#### Step 1


Combine the raspberries, sugar and lemon juice in a medium saucepan over high heat. Cook, stirring, for 5 mins or until sugar dissolves and raspberries collapse. Strain through a fine sieve into a jug, using the back of a spoon to press as much liquid through as possible. Discard solids. Cool.

#### Step 2

Pour the raspberry mixture evenly among serving glasses. Top with ice cubes. Pour over the prosecco or mineral water and serve immediately. Serve with strawberries, raspberries and mint sprigs.




