

HOW and WHY THE BOWEN MOUNTAIN ASSOCIATION WAS FORMED.



Part 1

This is an article written by John Leahy, a long-time resident of Bowen Mountain and lifetime BMA member documenting the history of the formation of the BMA. This is Part 1 of a series of articles, which will be published in subsequent Newsletters on the history of the BMA. We will be featuring these articles as part of the 50th Anniversary celebrations.

"Colo Shire Council was in a dilemma. Many of the blocks on the Bowen Mountain Subdivision (read about the subdivision in the next Newsletter) were too small or rocky to allow onsite absorption of effluent, meaning that permanent pump-out was required. The State Government had frozen building \until a solution was put forward. Landowners who couldn't build or sell were very irate.

Colo Council thought that the only long-term solution to their problem was reticulated water and sewerage. In November 1974, they commissioned the firm of Gutteridge, Haskins and Davey to prepare a feasibility study for them. This survey was to cover Bowen Mt. and Glossodia, another area with similar problems of small blocks. It was to be paid for by a special levy of \$50 over and above the normal rates in these areas. Previous such studies had been financed from the General Rates Fund.

In 1974 our rates on Bowen Mountain were about \$65 and Colo Council had already set the rates at \$110 for 1975, meaning that the rates totalled \$160, so you can understand that residents were incensed at a more than doubling of their rates from the previous year (Windsor and Richmond Gazette, 11th December 1974).

Letters of protest appeared in the local press and an overflow Public Meeting (Macquarie Towns Review, 6th February, 1975) concerning the rates was held at Wilberforce School of Arts Hall on 31st January 1975. The protest were over the following issues:

- 1. Water and sewerage had not been requested by local residents who at considerable cost had installed adequate water storage and absorption facilities.
- 2. The feasibility study was commissioned prior to a full Council decision to allow it to proceed and it was not properly authorised (Windsor and Richmond Gazette, 30th July, 1975).
- 3. The legality of charging the special rate was open to question (Letter- Solicitors George P. Rhodes and Co, 17th March, 1975).

A public meeting regarding the rates was held on Bowen Mt. on the 16th February 1975 at which the Bowen Mountain Association (BMA) was formed. A Constitution was outlined and five executive members were elected: President, Terry McGuire; Vice President, Richard Willmot; Secretary, Kees Verhagen; Treasurer, Steve Owens; Publicity Officer, Rob Morey.

The President, Terry McGuire spoke at a special meeting of Colo Council, wrote letters to local papers and sought legal opinion on the \$50 levy. Rob Morey, as Publicity Officer decided to challenge the \$50 levy in the Court of Petty Sessions at Windsor on 18th April 1975, which he had to do as an individual, however the appeal was on behalf of the BMA and members of the Glossodia Progress Association.

Another letter appealed for further donations as legal costs had risen to \$160. Half of these legal costs had been donated by the Glossodia Progress Association. It was proposed that "the BMA along with the Glossodia Progress Association meet the legal costs incurred by Mr Morey in his application to the Equity Court", estimated to be in the vicinity of \$175". So, you can see that the BMA was heading for legal confrontation. How this has turned around to mutual co-operation will be described in Part 2 in the next Newsletter, as well as the reason why Bowen Mountain land was subdivided like it was.

- To act either alone or in association with other bodies, corporations or persons in furtherance of any or all of the Associations objects.
- To raise funds, acquire, own, lease, rent, hire, mortgage and dispose of any property, including real property and expend any monies for any purpose which directly or indirectly may be associated with the attainment of any or all of the objects of the Association.
- Provide support services to elderly and infirmed residents through our Community Care programs;
- Lobbying for appropriate road and other infrastructure development, as appropriate, to maintain and improve the safety and well-being of residents;
- Working with emergency services (RFS, SES, Police, other) to mitigate against the threat of emergency situations, and assist in communication and support of those services during such events.

RFS FIRE REPORT – Spring & Summer 2024

Residents are strongly advised to begin to review their Bush Fire Survival Plan and preparing their properties before the Bushfire Season begins. We just held our get ready weekend in the Bowen Mountain Park in conjunction with the Spring Fair. We held two information sessions about how residents could best prepare themselves and their properties for the upcoming bushfire season. If you couldn't make it to the park, email us at comm-ed@gyrfb.com and ask about having us come to your house to help guide you in how to prepare.

Bush Fire Season: the Bush Fire Season for the Hawkesbury began on the 1st October 2024 and will continue until the 31st March 2025 unless otherwise advised.



Pile Burns: if you are planning to undertake a pile burn, you will need to undertake the following:

- 1. Review the Hawkesbury City Council Open Burning Policy and complete the online notification at https://www.hawkesbury.nsw.gov.au/ resources/forms/open-burning
- 2. Notify the NSW RFS of your intention to undertake a pile burn by completing the online notification at https://www.rfs.nsw.gov.au/fire-information/BFDP/burn-notifications
- 3. From the 1st October, you will also require a **Fire Permit** which may be obtained by contacting the Grose Vale Brigade's Permit Issuing Officer.

NOTE: Hawkesbury City Council advises the following:

- **a)** Pile burns and other fires must be put out by the end of the day and **not** smoulder overnight.
- b) Within the Bushfire Danger Period, burning shall only be conducted between 8am and midnight on any day (the fire cannot burn all night).
- c) Outside the Bushfire Danger Period, burning shall only be conducted between 8am and 5pm on any day (the fire must be out by 5pm).

PREPARE YOUR BUSH FIRE SURVIVAL PLAN WITH FOUR SIMPLE STEPS



STEP 1 - DISCUSS WHAT TO DO IF A BUSH FIRE THREATENS YOUR HOME

Many households find that having a discussion over dinner works best, as everybody is together and focussed.



STEP 2 - PREPARE YOUR HOME AND GET IT READY FOR BUSH FIRE SEASON

There are simple things you can do around your home to prepare it for a bush fire, such as keeping the grass low and having a cleared area around your home.



STEP 3 - KNOW THE BUSH FIRE ALERT LEVELS

If there is a fire in your area, you will find its alert level on the NSW RFS website and in the 'Fires Near Me' app. You need to keep track of the alert level so you know what you should do.



STEP 4 - KEEP ALL THE BUSH FIRE INFORMATION NUMBERS, WEBSITES AND THE SMARTPHONE APP

In a bush fire, it is important that you stay up to date on conditions in your area.

It is a fact. If you and your home are well prepared, you stand a better chance of surviving a bush fire. Download the four simple steps today from the NSW Rural

Brigade happenings:

Sadly, we recently lost an integral part of the brigade, and brigade patron Mr Robert (Chippa) Turner. Robert had been a member of the Grose Vale Brigade for almost 60 years and was dearly loved and respected by all members that had the pleasure of knowing him. Robert was still attending emergency incidents and driving the fire trucks for the brigade at 80 years of age, and with the help of walking aids, he was still attending brigade activities until almost halfway through this year. It is taking a small army to keep up with all that Robert did for the brigade.

We have been to numerous small vegetation fires already that have us concerned for the fire season ahead after seeing how easily they spread and the intensity they burned with, again highlighting the need to be prepared and responsible if burning on your property. The National Parks Hazard reduction at Woods Reserve, and a bushfire at Yarramundi the day before, has shown us that in the cooler part of the year, there was no issue with them spreading quickly. That fire activity will increase greatly as the summer temperatures settle in.

While cleaning gutters and properties in preparation for the fire season, I'd like to remind the residents to also clean their chimneys before next winter. Grose Vale attended chimney and house fires over winter, also reminding us of the importance of working smoke alarms in our houses.

New Members: We are currently training 6 new members that we hope to be able to have qualified before the fire season ramps up. We have had several new support members join to assist the brigade in non-fire-fighting roles, and some have joined other district support brigades like catering and communications (Radio operators).

THE BUNYA PINE – LOGO OF THE BOWEN MOUNTAIN ASSOCIATION

The majestic Bunya Pine below which is featured from a 1994 photo on the front cover of this Newsletter was the centerpiece of Bowen Mountain Park as it was the highest landmark on Bowen Mountain and could be seen from as far away as Castle Hill. Due to its significance it was adopted in the 1980's as the logo for the Bowen Mountain Association. The logo, below which is on all Bowen Mountain Association correspondence, is also the logo for our Facebook page.

Unfortunately, several years ago due to significant disease identified by Hawkesbury Council and a range of experts the dying Bunya Pine had to be chopped down. In 2014, three Bunya Trees (all in one pot) were donated by Terry Hoare to be planted in memory of Rick Jamieson.

They are from seeds from the original Bunya in the Park.

The Bunya Pine known also as the banya or bunya-bunya is a large evergreen coniferous tree in the *Araucariaceae bidwillii* family. It is regarded as an ancient fossil endemic to Australia. The leaves are small and rigid with a sharp tip measuring up to 5 cm long, which can easily penetrate the skin. The leaf arrangement is interesting as one pair of leaves are produced opposite each other on the twig while the next pair is rotated around the twig at 90 degrees to them as seen in the photo below.



The trees, which can grow up to 45 metres tall and live for more than 1,000 years, are known for their enormous football-sized spiky cones which can weigh up to 10 kilograms. The male and female cones are large measuring up to 30 cm long and 20cm wide. During December through to March female cones are green with 50 - 100 segments each of which encloses a seed. These cones have been known to drop from a tree without warning.

Bunya pines have a rich Indigenous history as the nuts inside the cones were an important food source for Aboriginal people in Queensland and northern New South Wales. They are rich in protein, amino acids, minerals, omega-3 and omega-6 fatty acids.

CULINARY CORNER



Ingredients

- 1 BBQ chicken cut into slices
- 4 yellow peaches or nectarines stoned, cut into wedges
- 200g cherry tomatoes, halved
- Rocket and oak lettuce leaves torn
- 1/2 cup (80g) almonds, toasted, coarsely chopped
- toasted sour dough bread, cut into cubes for croutons.

Honey-pepper dressing

- 1/3 cup (80ml) extra virgin olive oil
- 2 tbs honey
- 2 tbs sherry or balsamic vinegar
- 1 1/2 tsp cracked black pepper
- 1 tsp Dijon mustard

Method

- 1. To make the honey-pepper dressing, place the oil, honey, vinegar, pepper and mustard in a screw-top jar and shake until well combined. Season.
- 2. Place the chicken in a large bowl. Drizzle with 2 ths of the dressing and toss to combine. Set aside for 10 mins to develop the flavours.
- 3. Arrange the sliced chicken. Arrange the peach, tomato, rocket and lettuce in a large serving bowl. Add the toasted sour dough bread, cut into cubes for croutons.
- 4. Top with chicken and almond. Drizzle with remaining dressing and divide among serving bowls.

SUMMER ALIVE - RASPBERRY nnd PROSCESSO PUNCH



Ingredients


- 200g raspberries
- 2 tbs caster sugar
- 2 tbs lemon juice
- Ice cubes, to serve
- 1.5L rosé prosecco, chilled

Method

- 1. Combine the raspberries, sugar and lemon juice in a medium saucepan over high heat. Cook, stirring, for 5 mins or until sugar dissolves and raspberries collapse.
- 2. Strain through a fine sieve into a jug, using the back of a spoon to press as much liquid through as possible. Discard solids. Cool.
- 3. Pour the raspberry mixture evenly among serving glasses. Top with ice cubes. Pour over the prosecco or mineral water and serve immediately. Serve with strawberries, raspberries and mint sprigs.
